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2.1. Section Numbering

The section number and title is typed in capital letters and located in the center of the line. The subsections title is typed in italic with capital first letters of words.

2.2. Formulas

Decimal digits in the text and figures are typed only through a period: 0.5

Formulas are numbered according to sections: (1.1), (1.2), (2.1), (2.2) etc., where the first number indicates the number of the section, and the second is the ordinal number in this section.

Vectors and matrices are typed in bold upright type (the arrow above the vector is not used). Numbers, Greek letters and functions, such as $\sin 2x$, $\cos \omega t$, etc., are typed in roman type.

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


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



Fig.2. Caption
